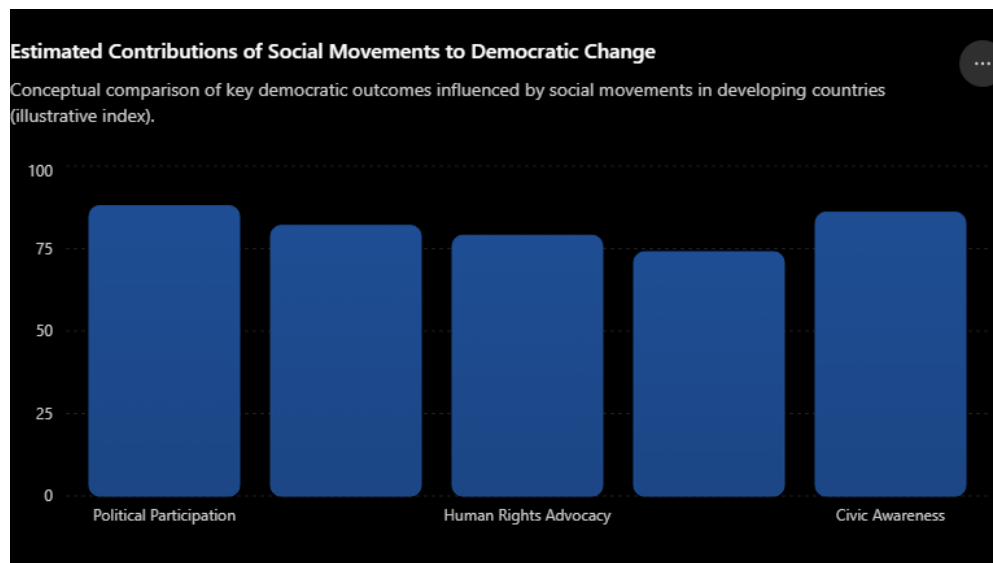
Digital Activism and Civic Mobilization:
